The untold story of the famous resistance group

Miriam Gebhardt is a historian and journalist and teaches history at the University of Konstanz. She was awarded a PhD for her study *Fear of the Juvenile Tyrant: A History of Upbringing in the 20th Century* (2009). DVA published her books *Rudolf Steiner: A Modern Prophet* (2011) and *Alice in No-Man's Land: How the German Women's Movement Lost the Women* (2012). Her bestseller *When the Soldiers Came* (2015) has been translated into several languages.

When nowadays the "White Rose" is mentioned, we automatically think of Hans and Sophie Scholl. With their arrest and execution in February 1943 the brother and sister became icons of German resistance against the NS dictatorship and figures of identification especially for young people.

But the focus on the charismatic siblings makes us forget that the White Rose had some 80 members active not only in Munich but also in several other cities. Little is heard about these resistance fighters and their families who, after the group had been exposed, were also killed or imprisoned.

Miriam Gebhardt tells here a new history of the White Rose, one that does justice to the complexity of the group in its structure and motives. Hers is an impressive account of how heavily the legacy of the resistance weighed particularly on those whose deeds were barely acknowledged when the dictatorship was over.

Peter Longerich, born in 1955, professor of modern history at the Royal Holloway College of the University of London and the founder of the college's Holocaust Research Centre, has been active at the Bundeswehr University in Munich since 2013. The internationally renowned expert on the history of Nazism has published numerous documentations; his books *Politics of Destruction* (1998) and *We Knew Nothing of All This* (2006) are standard works. His biographies of Heinrich Himmler (2008), Joseph Goebbels (2010) and Adolf Hitler (2015) were acclaimed worldwide.

On January 20, 1942, fifteen high-ranking representatives of the NS state, following an invitation by Richard Heydrich, met in a luxurious villa on the Wannsee to discuss the "final solution" of the "Jewish question". The minutes of the meeting record that the decision taken was to deport a total of eleven million people, expose them to murderous forced labour and use other methods to kill any survivors and those unable to work.

Peter Longerich, one of the most eminent researchers into NS history, reveals how, in the minds of Third Reich leaders, the vague intention of destroying the Jews developed into a precise and clear-cut murder programme and how hugely significant the Wannsee Conference was within the context of the Holocaust. The book contains the complete minutes of the Wannsee Conference, annotated by Peter Longerich.

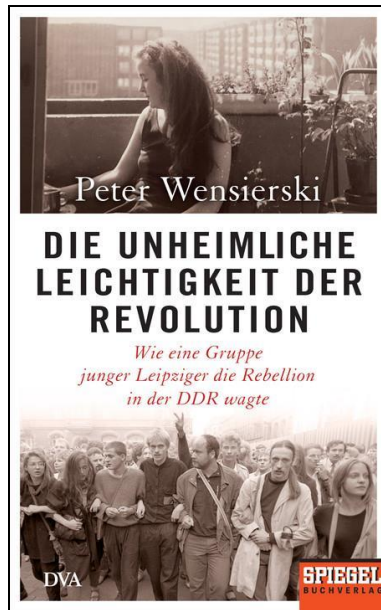

They write letters and risk a lot – the addressee: BBC, London. In 1949 the British Broadcasting Company started transmitting the programme "Unsigned Letters", in which, for 25 years, letters written anonymously by East Germans were read out every Friday evening.

Susanne Schädlich came across these unique documents and in her book tells us about the British journalists who stood up to East Germany for such a long time. More than anything else she erects a monument in honour of the courageous letter-writers who were mercilessly persecuted by State Security, the "Stasi".

"I have to write anonymously; that means the name of the place and title are accurate but everything else fictitious. This procedure is necessary because I am writing from a region in which Democratic Freedom is only known in books, where the brown dictatorship has been replaced by a red dictatorship [...]. If this letter were to be written under my true name and read by the wrong people, I'd be sure to be shot in the neck."

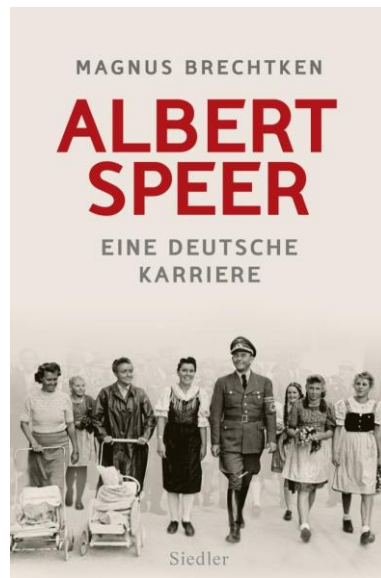
Peter Wensierski, born in 1954, has been working for the *Spiegel* since 1993. Previous to that, he had regularly reported from East Germany as a documentary film maker, journalist and author of books. His book *The Forbidden Journey* (2014) was a bestseller.

They are young and irreverent; they refuse to follow the system and they challenge the state. They no longer want to fit in. They live together in derelict buildings and spend long nights by the lake discussing their next operations, clandestinely print pamphlets, party in illegal bars until dawn and the next day are in the first row of a demonstration. They are persecuted, but with each new operation they lose a little more of their fear – and the dictatorship some of its power.

For the first time in its history, Germany has a successful revolution. It all started in Leipzig, and is followed by a wild year of anarchy.

The renowned journalist Peter Wensierski tells the true story of an exceptional group of young people leading a fight others thought was futile.

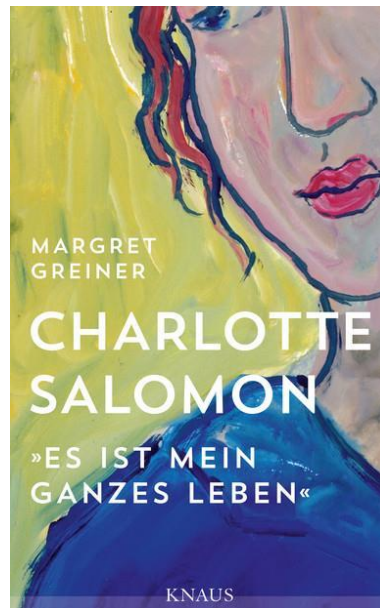
Magnus Brechtken, born in 1964, gained his PhD in history at Bonn University and taught at the Ludwig Maximilian University in Munich and at the University of Nottingham before being appointed to the post of deputy director of the Munich Institute for Contemporary History in 2012. It was in this function that he was in charge of the project to publish a scientifically annotated critical edition of Hitler's *Mein Kampf*.

NSDAP member since 1931 and soon one of Hitler's intimates, Albert Speer quickly became the architect of the racial state. As armaments minister during the war he was tirelessly on the go in support of the total state and extermination machinery. After the war he nevertheless claimed never to have really supported the state and never to have been a proper Nazi.

Magnus Brechtken shows how Speer managed to spread this legend and how millions of Germans greedily sucked it up so as not to have to face their own guilt.

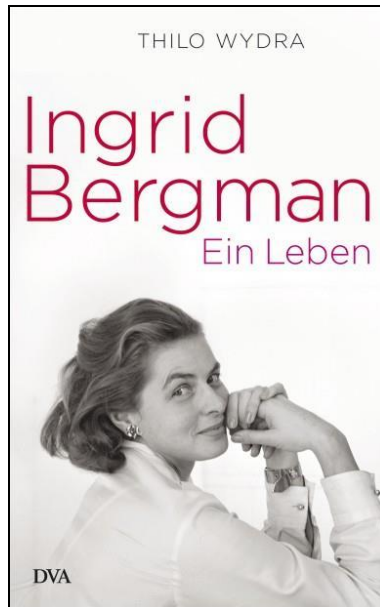
Margret Greiner studied German and history and spent many years working as a teacher and journalist. Her work has regularly focussed on the lives of exceptional women. Her most recent narrative biographies were *Cut Out for Freedom*, *Emilie Flöge: Fashion Designer and Life Companion of Gustav Klimt* and *Charlotte Berend-Corinth and Lovis Corinth: I Want to Belong to Myself*.

Who is the young woman who with her paintings took possession of her life with such impressive power and this way defied death?

It is only in recent years, shortly before the approaching anniversary of her birthday 100 years ago, that Charlotte Salomon has increasingly become the focus of public attention again. The artist and writer – murdered by the Nazis in Auschwitz at the age of 26 – left behind an impressive autobiographical oeuvre: a series of almost 800 pictures, a story board of her short and tragic life, a kind of "Anne Frank in images".

Margret Greiner has taken this diary in colour as the starting point for her research and placed Salomon's self-portrait in the centre of her narrative biography.

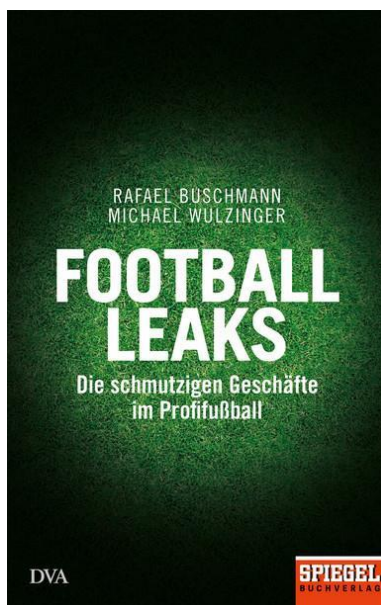
Thilo Wydra, born in 1968, studied comparative studies, German, art history and film science. He has been freelancing as an author and journalist since the 1990s. In 1996 he became a member of the Verband der deutschen Filmkritik (VdFK) and is on juries at international film festivals. He has authored numerous contributions to books on film and film lexica, writes for newspapers and magazines and has written biographies of Alfred Hitchcock, Grace Kelly and others.

Ingrid Bergman (1915-1982) is one of the few women to become a world star in the world of movies. Her best-known films include such classics as Alfred Hitchcock's *Notorious*, *Gaslight*, *Casablanca*, *For Whom the Bell Tolls*, *Cactus Flower* and *Autumn Sonata*. The career of the actress revered as "Joan of Arc" lasted for almost 50 years and resulted in three Academy Awards.

Her life, on the other hand, was one without a firm foundation. She was born of a Swedish father and a German mother, and both her parents died while she was still very young. Her relationship with film director Roberto Rossellini caused a scandal, especially in the USA, and cost her a lot of public sympathy.

Using new source material and integrating conversations with Bergman's colleagues (such as film legend Liv Ullmann) and family members (e.g. with her daughters Isabella Rossellini and Pia Lindström), Thilo Wydra describes the impressively wide-ranging work and a life of passion of this great actress – a woman who was torn to a larger extent than her public image would deem possible.

Ralf Buschmann, born in Zabrze (Poland) in 1982, studied German, psychology, sport and education. He joined the sports desk of *Spiegel Online* as a reporter in 2010 and then moved to the *Spiegel* in 2013. For his report on the disclosure of the irregularities behind the 2006 World Cup he and his co-authors were awarded the 2015 Henri Nannen Prize.

Michael Wulzinger, born in 1965, studied history, political science and German, joined the *Spiegel* sports desk in 1997 and was its head until September 2016.

The fact that the world of football is less and less about sport and increasingly about dirty dealings is something football fans have been suspecting long before the FIFA scandals. But *Football Leaks* sheds light for the first time on the shadowy world of this industry and the whole spectrum of the greed holding sway behind the scenes of international football.

Whistleblower "John" has handed over 1.9 terabytes of secret data to the weekly *Spiegel*, amounting to 18.6 million documents on negotiations, contracts and agreements – documents that reveal that for stakeholders in international football, be they clubs, players or agents, morals and laws do not count.

For *Football Leaks*, Rafael Buschmann and Michael Wulzinger spent months doing research and now reveal the highly explosive material they have extracted from the data, including the secret player contracts of Mesut Özil, Gareth Bale and Cristiano Ronaldo, and the take-it-or-leave-it contracts of players' agents. Their book is at the same time a gripping story of a whistleblower who wants to liberate football from its Mafia structures – and is now himself being hunted.

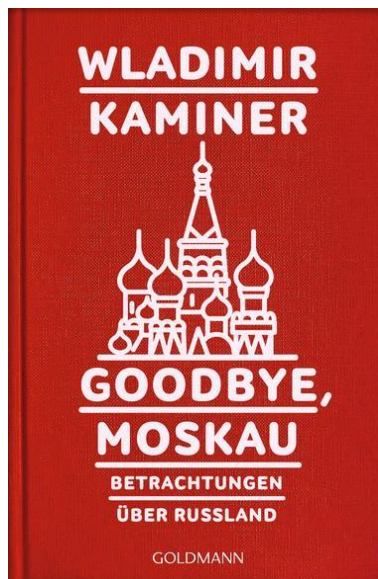
Hans-Peter Schwarz, born in 1934, is a professor of politics and contemporary history. His writings include two volumes on the Adenauer era in the *History of the Federal Republic of Germany* and the comprehensive two-volume Adenauer biography. He has been awarded numerous prizes, among them the Ernst Robert Curtius Essay Prize.

Since the refugee crisis came to a head in autumn 2015, migration, refugee policies and asylum laws have been dominating the political agenda in Germany and Europe. The EU is facing a crucial test. Yet there had already been signs of the crisis for a long time.

The distinguished historian and political scientist Hans-Peter Schwarz adds a historical dimension to the present discussion. He demonstrates how mistakes in the construction of the Schengen agreement and EU refugee laws have made the present situation possible – and how erratic policies of improvisation and muddling through, not to mention signs of EU disintegration, have further exacerbated it.

Precisely and to the point, Schwarz analyses the problems of this once-in-a-century task and suggests five guidelines for a new course in refugee policies.

On the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the October Revolution, Wladimir Kaminer takes a look at the country of his birth and sees a country looking for itself.

The communist experiment came to an end to the applause of the free world; the people, however, are still there, and they need a perspective. Capitalism is tempting as a new model of success, but the Russians are looking in vain for a shady spot under the hard sun of finance. The towels of other countries have already been spread out. Instead of affluence, progress and freedom, repression and fear rule the day. The political leadership under Putin are adept at retaining power but not very much so at forming the future. Ignoring Europe, the path being taken goes into the past and towards isolation.

More than enough material for an affectionately desperate discourse with Russia.

Guido Mingels was born in Lucerne in 1970 and studied German, linguistics and philosophy in Berne and Frankfurt. He has contributed to several German-language media, including *Geo*, *mare* and the *Tagesspiegel*, and was the deputy chief editor of the magazine of the *Tagesanzeiger* in Zürich, later becoming the newspaper's New York correspondent. Since 2012 he has been a reporter on social matters for the *Spiegel*.

Let's be honest: what do you think – do more people die in plane crashes than used to be the case or fewer? Are there more wars and war casualties than 30 years ago or fewer? Are more children the victims of child labour and violence today or fewer? And the crime rate – is it rising or falling?

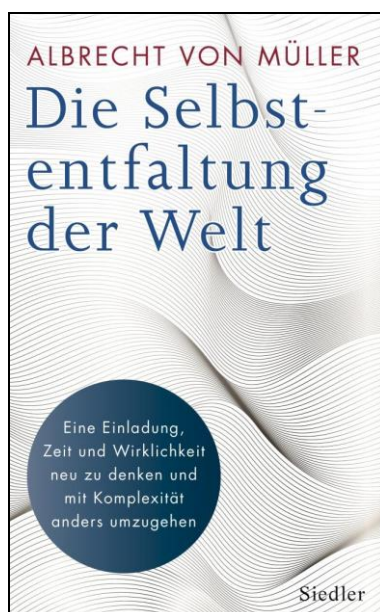

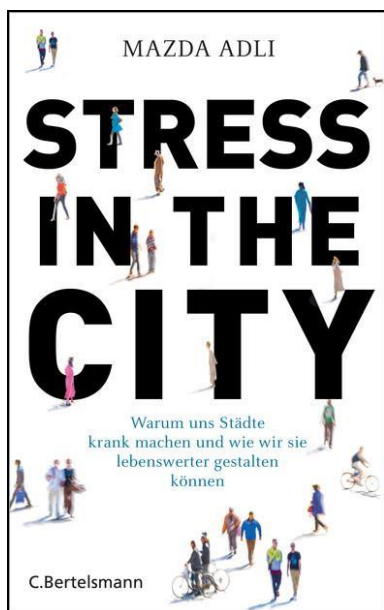

Albrecht von Müller, born in 1954, has a PhD in philosophy, spent many years working with Carl-Friedrich von Weizsäcker at the Max Planck Institute for Physics and was the director of the European Center for International Security (EUCIS). He has advised large organisations and various governments and individual people, including Nelson Mandela and Mikhail Gorbachev. In 2001 he launched the Parmenidis Foundation, the objective of which is interdisciplinary exploration of complex thinking. As an entrepreneur in the digital sector, von Müller has always also been interested in the practical implementation of the result of foundational research.

Our world has become so complex that our way of thinking can hardly keep up. Albrecht von Müller, philosopher and the director of the multidisciplinary Parmenidis Foundation at the University of Munich, demonstrates in his book that we cannot meet the challenge with technical means – but only and especially by changing our way of thinking.

The author is one of the most unusual minds at the interface between science, politics and business.

Mazda Adli studied medicine and afterwards became a junior doctor at the Clinic for Psychiatry at the Free University in Berlin. In 2004 he was appointed senior physician at the Clinic for Psychiatry and Psychotherapy at the Charité. The focus of his scientific work is mainly on research into stress and depression. As the executive director, he initiated the World Health Summit at the Charité in 2009. In 2013 he became the medical director of the Fliedner Clinic in Berlin.

Forecasts for 2050 say that about two-thirds of the world's population will be living in cities. Yet is it not precisely these cities, with their deafening noise, their hustle and bustle, their anonymity and the problem of isolation, not to mention exhaust fumes, that make us sick in body and soul?

The psychiatrist and stress researcher Mazda Adli has been looking into these issues for years within the "Stress in the City" project at the Charité in Berlin; he has developed a smartphone app to measure stress, has chosen an interdisciplinary approach for his book and argues in favour of the creation of places that are not built up so that in spite of high stress levels cities remain worth living in.

He is also much in demand as a speaker at company and medical congresses. Spork has published several popular scientific non-fiction books, including the 2009 bestselling *The Second Code* and is also the author and editor of the newsletter *Epigenetics*.

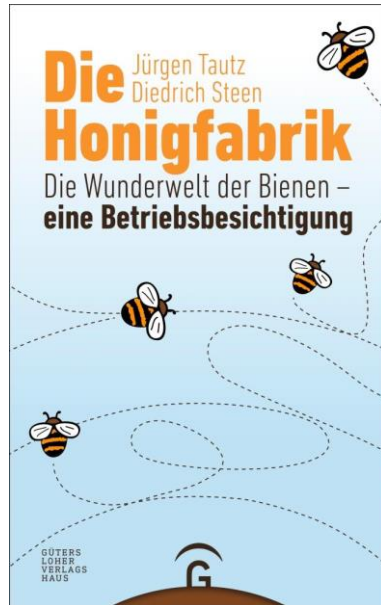
