
Yet as Tamara comes to know the Crowpeople's way of life, and the threats they face from humanity's exploration into deep space, she realises she has an impossible choice to make.

ABOUT CALLY BLACK AMPERSAND PRIZE-WINNER

When Cally Black isn't writing wild, dark stories for young adults, she writes pleasant and educational stories for children. To protect her much younger readers from her darker books, Cally uses a pseudonym to keep her two identities separate.

She's been working on writing for a long time and now her hard work is paying off. Since winning the **Ampersand Prize** and a publishing deal with Hardie Grant Egmont for *In the Dark Spaces*, Cally has gone on to write a middle-grade novel called *How to Bee* (May 2017, Allen & Unwin) under the name Bren MacDibble.

Cally lives in Melbourne with her family and a slightly nutty dog. She could share many stories about her own adventures – of hill country sheep stations, thrilling backpacking journeys and motorbike rides across the USA – but it's stories set in future worlds that fascinate her the most. And while she loves science and technology and the way they shape our future, what really grabs her is people, especially those left on the fringes of society.

A CHAT WITH CALLY BLACK AMPERSAND PRIZE-WINNER

Is In the Dark Spaces your first published book?

Technically, yes. I won the Ampersand Prize and a contract with Hardie Grant Egmont in 2015 for *In The Dark Spaces*, a young-adult sciencefi tion thriller. Shortly after that I signed a children's book deal with Allen & Unwin, under the name Bren MacDibble. Different names help separate the readerships and *In The Dark Spaces* is a little wild and dark for primary school readers. The younger book slipped past *In The Dark Spaces* in the final mo ths of production and hit the shelves firs . Both are out in 2017 within months of each other, so it's a rush of excitement.

Did you receive many, if any, rejections prior?

Only about a gazillion! At the time I entered Ampersand I'd stopped sending work out and turned inwards to focus on my writing to try to understand why it got attention but never an offer, and to try to improve.

What inspired the first idea for In the Dark Spaces?

I'd read *Hunger Games* and *5th Wave* and I thought, you know what? These authors are having fun and letting go and not censoring themselves. Gloves off! 'm going to go into a novel swinging and punching.

What parts of writing do you find easiest? And hardest?

I find being the cha acter and writing the openings the easiest. I love writing dialogue. Finding a voice. I love setting the character free to tell her story. Endings are hard. Being bound by word counts and pacing is also hard. Not letting the dark parts of the stories overwhelm the light, because my darkometer is a bit stuffed.

What's the highlight of winning the Ampersand Prize so far?

During my first visit o Hardie Grant Egmont, a woman from marketing came to meet me. I was nervous I was being assessed for marketability but she said she adored the book so much she had to meet the person who wrote it! My first fan
