

The Casino was transformed into Scala di Milano. A snake was writhing within your gut. Your gaze was dark, deep. It screamed bird rebellion. You were burdened by a double despair. A powerful combination of Dalida and Callas. Your figure appeared to me like blurred by the mesmerizing sentences uttered by Cleopatra, your slot machine.

I moved closer to you and, for a few seconds, you stopped playing.

Luz is hired as a slot-machine attendant at a casino, hoping to gain a better understanding of her grandmother's and mother's pathological gambling, to grasp what's at the root of that family's addiction. There she meets Madame B., who shares her passion for Leonard Cohen's music and towards whom she develops a boundless fascination. While Luz eventually escapes from that murky realm out of self-preservation, the fallen bourgeoise continues to exert her spell on her, rekindled and magnified tenfold by Cohen's death.

Exploring the abyss of obsessive ties, *Maquina* offers a conceptual experience through *the place of all names* that unfolds, sometimes Circus, sometimes Tavern, sometimes Museum, sometimes Opera... Its dense, poetic spiral traps us into the gears of all thoses overpowering machines.

Originally from Uruguay, Lula Carballo writes, translates, teaches creative workshops and presents performative manifestations of her texts through residencies, conferences and public meetings. Her first novel Créatures du hasard was published in 2018. Ensemble nous voyageons, a children book co-written with Catherine Anne Laranjo and illustrated by artist Kesso, was published in 2021. Her poems and translations can be found in various specialized magazines.



NOMMER LE VIVANT

[Naming the Living]

I tell myself that some people have a more accessible joie de vivre than others. As fast growing species, they easily impose themselves by spreading high in the sky. I try to convince myself that my mental health issues can make me a stronger person. Like cedar, I grow in the shade and thrive in arid environments.

Plagued by recurrent suicidal thoughts and malaise, Myrique stayed in psychiatric wards several times. They eventually pay attention to other patients, they listen to their singular experiences, and then write portraits of them that are as lucid as they are benevolent. Inspired by Brother Marie-Victorin's *Flore laurentienne* and their own forest explorations in the Bas-du-Fleuve, they begin the project of learning to name living things, in all their strengths and weaknesses, their glories and miseries, in the hope of shedding light on their own.

Originally from Montreal, Mélilot de Repentigny has been living in Rimouski, in the Bas-Saint-Laurent since 2018, a region they now call home and where they practice wild foraging. Nommer le vivant is their first book.

It's the same road she walked on earlier. Tania has her headlamp with her, so finding back her hunting tower should be easy. Although she's never been good at making wise choices among humans, she's always known how to find her way in the forest.

Summer 1984. Avid of freedom, Lyne and her lover get lost as they set off to explore the backwoods. They find shelter in a cabin once built by a trapper. What awaits them there will change their lives forever.


From ancestor Léopold to grandfather Siméon, and between Lyne, the mother, and Tania the daughter, Julien Gravelle weaves time and points of view to portrait the rise and fall of the Malençons in Fond-du-Lac, a family whose roots lie deep in the soil of the boreal plains and who, from generation to generation, have born a heavy secret in the heart of the magnificent and overwhelming nature of northern Lac-Saint-Jean.

Frenchman Julien Gravelle has lived in Quebec since 2006. His writing is driven by an ethical reflection that he puts into words in the form of novels (Nitassinan), stories (Musher; Debout sur la carlingue) or essays (Nos renoncements). Simultaneously with If, Leméac will release a paperback edition of his 2021 crime novel Les cowboys sont fatigués, that was also published in French-speaking Europe by Éditions du Seuil.

[The Ostrowski Effect]

Who can say with certainty that reality is truer than dreams? Ultimately, it is of little importance to distinguish the true from the false, the authentic from the imagined. Omissions and mirages make up the salt, the silence essential to the music of reality, which is never fixed or monolithic.

Séverine, an inventive and determined mother, holds daughter and son captive of her singular reality. But cracks start to appear in the fortress she has erected when the father, barred from entering, turns up at the door to expose the truth (his own version of it?) about the son's origins.

From that moment, Séverine intends to keep the situation under control, and untangles the web of a hitherto hidden life that the two children, with awe and sometimes with exasperation, will accept until the obligatory return to their roots.

From what could have been a perfect recipe for family breakdown, emerges instead a book of happy memories, where one can tailor destiny instead of being subjected to it.


Éric Ilhareguy's second work of fiction confirms the persistence of a consistent writer.

[Toronto, Never Blue]

The harsh reality of Toronto's streets is tackled here headon and without prejudice. Homelessness, prostitution, drugs, pornography, police brutality... Many urban creatures live together, give birth to each other and intertwine to create a mosaic of broken dreams, in the toughest part of downtown Toronto.

Meet young homeless Hannah, who dreams of the seaside as she drifts from street to street, then Carol, who gives birth in a squalid alleyway, and finally four prostitutes in the prime of life who share lodgings, old clients, misfortunes and small joys, in a novel that recounts the days and nights of free, uncompromising women. But as we watch these lifelines constantly cross paths with male distress in its many forms – an unscrupulous drug dealer, a mentally ill young man who takes a bus hostage, sick and sadistic customers – we wonder if the ugliness they harbour within doesn't come from the city itself, never blue and always grey, incapable of alleviating, curing, or eradicating its own deviance.

Sensitive souls, take a deep breath, for we are truly at the gates of Hell...

Born in Quebec City, Marie-Hélène Larochelle is Professor of Literature at York University in Toronto. She has published various academic works, as well as two novels: Daniil et Vanya (2017) and Je suis le courant la vase (2021). The latter book was shortlisted for the Trillium Literary Award.

CE DÉSIR ME POINT

[I, Desire]

My desire didn't need any object; revelling in the possibilities to come, it was ready to set its sights on anyone. It was a strong, affable, and courageous companion.

I've been an involuntary single female from 2010 to 2020. It had never happened to me before. I didn't know we were called like that. We weren't yet for that matter. I wasn't equipped to face it. Ending up "on the market" makes you feel like you've been rolled-over by a steamroller.

As in *Le nénuphar et l'araignée*, published in 2015, where she examined fears, Claire Legendre's new text explores the various forms of desire - sexual desire, the desire to please, to possess, to be possessed - which often come together in the absence and expectation of love.

You can't deliberately reject desire and yet, by dint of habit and resignation, you sometimes come to omit yourself and withdraw almost voluntarily from the march of time.

We love, we suffer, we flee, we wander; we identify with what we lack, until desire becomes a gaping wound, impossible to heal. It's then up to writing to begin closing it.


The short chapters that make up *Ce désir me point* confirm Claire Legendre's concise and remarkable style that subtly reveals what's beneath the surface of existence.

Claire Legendre was born in Nice and has lived in Montreal since 2011. She has published a dozen books in France and Quebec. Bermudes, her most recent novel, was shortlisted for the Prix des libraires du Québec in 2021.

[The Night Funambulist]

There's no more mystery then, everything becomes obvious, crystal clear, even though Sven knows the future is fragile, knows the next tide will shatter the ice pack, destroying the calm and tranquility that once were within reach.

But winter's not here yet.

On an offshore drilling rig, Sven, the head nurse, watches as a helicopter, called to evacuate a critically injured man, flies away.

Two years later, isolating himself on an island that was once home to a slate quarry, Sven looks back on his loosely tied relationship with Solveig, his strange attraction to Niels, the injured man from the beginning, and the even stranger relationship the latter entertained with his sister Else, a circus artist.

Through this tale of an unlikely friendship between two men with nothing in common, questions of responsibility, guilt and redemption are explored, following an arc that goes from grief to hard-won peace.


Reminiscent of Simenon in his most sensitive books, Emmanuel Poinot's *La nuit funambule* confirms a discreet and touching writer, reaching subtly within human nature and emotions.

Like thousands of climate migrants, Irene and Mia flee one impossible world for another. Driven by the overpowering love that binds them, mother and daughter head for L'Étoile de la Montagne, a luxury hotel that acts on them like some magnetic north, an Eldorado, a vital hope.

Judy Quinn's uncompromising and precise language describes the chaos of human experience and the whirlwind of meaning it carries along, leading us naturally into the inhabited zone of the uninhabitable.

A poet and a novelist, Judy Quinn won the 2012 Robert-Cliche Prize with Hunter s'est laissé couler. Her novels Les mains noires (2015) and L'homme-canon (2018) are published by Leméac.

A few weeks before Christmas, the narrator's world implodes. Coming home from school, in the glare of revolving lights, she learns that her father has taken his own life. At the young age of nine, she is brutally faced with the haunting emptiness left by the desertion of a parent, but also with the incomprehension of her mother, who promptly remaries, eliminating all memory of the departed.

As the years pass, she becomes a tormented teenager barricaded behind a wall of indifference, trying to exorcise through writing the impact that December evening had on her.

Blending narrative and poetic prose, Véronique D'Anjou recounts the blast and the shockwave, the awe and the sadness, the anger and the revolt, the waiting and the fragile beginnings of reconstruction.

"For most people, the body's the first to go. Sometimes, it's the mind. Me, that's my heart that left me. Too fast. Too soon. And now I'm stuck with my body. And I'm all there."

Véronique D'Anjou was born in Val-d'Or in 1983. After a few meanderings, she finally settled in Montreal, where she's an elementary school teacher. Blast is her first book.

Freed at last from society's rigidity, they explore their dreams and memories, sharing their fears to better free themselves from them. Inside their bubble, Océane and Roch can exist safely and simply.


Driven by two straightforward, singular narrative voices, Stéfani Meunier's first YA novel is a clear and uncompromising text that gives substance to the elusive malaise that sometimes besets people who are different.

Stéfani Meunier was born in Montreal in 1971. After completing a Master's degree in Creative Writing at McGill University, she left town for the countryside and settled in Saint-Adolphe-d'Howard. Since 1999, she has published a collection of short stories and six novels.

Thirty-seven short scenes, thirty-seven murders. Along thirty-seven briefs interactions, various characters appear out of nowhere and vanish just as quickly, remaining long enough to utter a few sentences, contradict each other and die in an absurd way. Disgust, envy, greed, idleness: everything here justifies killing, as if such an overabundant and mundane violence could resolve any conflict.

In this playful collection of vignettes, where no one really relates to anyone else, humour and existential metaphor deftly coexist. Always halfway between the clownish and the disquieting, the play is a journey through human behaviour that sheds light on both private confrontations and political stakes. The language is efficient, clear, and as sharp as the situations. The play can be performed by as many actors as desired.

An actor, a director and a Kathakali specialist, he has also taught acting and playwriting. [Older By the Minute]

Pierre, Lucie, William, Adèle and Géraldine are in their twilight years. With bodies falling apart, they age before us in a piecemeal fashion, passing as best they can a time that runs in circles, sometimes sympathetic to their day and age, sometimes at war with it. A thousand details – the origin of an expression, the rain falling slowly, a distorted memory, a fleeting disagreement – permeate their discourse, a thousand agitations animate them. By turns funny, old-fashioned, scathing and philosophical, they exchange roles and pains, make bold confessions to each other, and set their mundane, existential refrain against the strangeness of the world. Under the watchful eye of an inexplicably mute clown...

Tackling the lucidity and the incongruities that come with age; tackling what brings us together as well as what drives us apart, and tackling everyone's little music, ethereal and incisive, sparkling and tragic, here is a play to laugh and wince at, written in the beautiful and spare language that's Larry Tremblay's hallmark.

LES GIRAFES EN FEU

[BURNING GIRAFFES]

After three unsuccessful business ventures, the renovation of their eight-room home, rockabilly, carpentry and Greek classes, and two break-ups in the same year, Daniel Fortin and Nancy Vallée are still willing to work things out and grow old together.

The opportunity to put their inventive spirit to work and inject some passion into their relationship arise when the owner of the seedy Le Chic motel suggests they revamp the image of his establishment.

With the help of their son, they form a partnership with the local zoo, which attracts renewed interest from the international artistic community since Olaf, a movie star gorilla, has moved there.

Celebrity tourists are invited to take part in exclusive banquets featuring experiences as captivating as they are disturbing – Dancing Desert, Inner Forest, Astral Herbal Tea, Cortical Salon... – offering visitors privileged access to the animals and a semblance of spirituality.

For a time, the Fortin-Vallée ambitions seem to become a reality, yet they remain unsatisfied. Daniel, obsessed with his work, suffers a series of heart attacks - which he inflicts on himself with repeated electric shocks - near-death experiences and resuscitations. Meanwhile, the revolutionary mascot group Burning Giraffes and graffiti artist Zen Lester protest against the noisy tourism that takes their city hostage...

Through irresistible humour, incredible situations and a the depiction of a highly unusual microcosm, Gabriel Allaire takes a sensitive and accurate look at long-lasting love, at work that often complicates relationships between people, and at the pitfalls of the American dream.

Born in Saint-Hyacinthe in 1990, Gabriel Allaire's first novel (Pas de géants) was published by Leméac and won the 2018 Robert-Walser Prize.

MÉGAPTÈRE

Since death is everywhere, it's best to tame it. It's in the very fabric of things, it irrigates, it nourishes - it allows life to move forward.

In May 2020, at the height of the pandemic, a stray whale made its way up the Saint-Lawrence river to Montreal, to the delight of many curious onlookers, but it finally got stranded, probably hit by a ship. Just as the whale was found dead, Martine Béland's mother passed away after a long illness. In her last moments, the woman who often preferred the company of animals to that of humans, asked for news of the megaptera, the word she used to designate the great marine mammal that fascinated her.

Using the coincidence of these two deaths as a starting point, the author traces the thread of a story and reflects on what makes a life worth living. From the Pacific coast, where yew trees used to cure cancer grow, to the shores of Sainte-Marie Bay, where the tide washes up its treasures every morning, Martine Béland gathers the scattered pieces of a mysterious, secret existence. She wanders through the landscape, rediscovering the objects and homes her mother knew and loved. It's in the heart of an old house with drawn curtains that the unspoken, failed dreams and unfulfilled desires of a woman who was once a young girl are to be found.


Halfway between essay and narrative, *Mégaptère* is a brilliant book. It reveals a first-rate writer, heir to Annie Dillard, whose keen eye and sensitive writing show how every life contains a world waiting to be discovered.

Born in Ottawa, Martine Béland has lived for many years in Ontario and Quebec before settling in Nova Scotia. She holds graduate degrees in philosophy, German studies and political studies. She has published books and articles in philosophy, and has translated two works by Nietzsche for Flammarion's «GF» series. Mégaptère is her first collection of essays.

[Handsome Devil]

In my fist, the pebble of sorrow, one, two, three, I blow, sadness is on the way, to my tale I return.

Withdrawn in the hinterland, François undertakes to trap his solitude in the tales he invents to patch up his shattered life. A shrewd storyteller, he hopes to put behind him the trials he went through - first and foremost, his daughter leaving - and to get closer to Mado, the landlady whose freckled skin and immense heart could fend off the remaining fears that lurk around him. Beau Diable, a seven-headed beast, will see to it in a terrifying way...

This magnificent story told by a man at the end of his tether, is both a exhilarating work on language and a brilliant piece of writing that fluctuates between truth and delight. François is surrounded by fabulous creatures — ancient coureurs des bois, a singular taxidermist, a long-distance truck driver — who walk with him along the most precious of paths, the one that brings him back to the world.



On the banks of an eternal river, three ghosts from another time meet. Now embodied as a rat, a fly, and a snake, all unloved animals, they feel they are better off than when they lived in human form. But, as they're still haunted by their former life, they set about telling their side of the story, expressing their shame, remorse and bitter feelings. Above all, they recount their memories of a ubiquitous common master, towards whom they now feel complex emotions and whose teaching they question. With their past actions not fully accomplished, they return, hoping to bring their destiny full circle with an ultimate act. Yet, what they've been through in the past was so tragic that, in their opinion, three hundred years would not suffice to rehabilitate them.

The political, moral and environmental issues raised by this novel are vaguely reminiscent of the partition of India and its spiritual leader, Mahatma Gandhi, but the free narrative style makes it seem more like a timeless drama repeated over and over again.


A master in the art of creating a dialogue between the living and the dead, Ying Chen shows once again that the borders between the two realms are rather bridges between two dimensions of the same terrible reality.

Born in 1961, a graduate of Fudan University (Shanghai) and McGill University, Ying Chen has published a dozen novels – including L'ingratitude, which was a finalist for the Prix Femina and won the Prix Québec-Paris and the Grand Prix des lectrices of Elle Québec – as well as two essays, including La lenteur des montagnes (2014). Her previous novel, Rayonnements (2020), evoked the destiny of Pierre and Marie Curie's family.

Recently settled in Vienna, the narrator discovers Egon Schiele's Portrait of Wally Neuzil, painted in 1912, during a visit to the museum. He is instanty captivated by the model, a young woman with fiery red hair and piercing blue eyes.

Who was this modest Austrian woman, who became Egon Schiele's muse and lover in early twentieth-century Vienna? How did the painting, after being stolen by the Nazis from its owner, art dealer Lea Bondi, find itself almost a hundred years later at the heart of a litigation that dragged on for over a decade in the United States?


Over the course of weeks, then months, the narrator recounts Wally's singular journey along with that of her famous portrait, telling in a very personal way the intersecting stories concealed in the clear gaze of the woman in the painting.

Standing in front of the kitchen window, I peered outside at the old abandoned rusty machinery in the yard. [...] The carcasses stood motionless, hemmed in by dry grass and bleached by autumn, like sun-dried insect moults. Looking at them in the midday light, I thought that maybe I, too, was an endangered species.

At the end of an abandoned logging road, somewhere between the Mistassini and Ouasiemsca rivers – as close to nowhere as you can get – Rozie lives alone with his dogs. The place suits him very well, and so does the solitude. Yet he's far less enthralled by his work that consists in manufacturing amphetamines in his clandestine laboratory for a gang of drug dealers. He would like to move on. But his past catches up with him, and he's about to lose everything.


After his debut short story collection *Debout sur la carlingue*, Julien Gravelle tackles enthusiastically the detective story with the same colourful language, set in the same magnificent and sometimes overwhelming nature, but this time driven by a breathless plot and a wry sense of humour.

LE VIEUX MONDE DERRIÈRE NOUS

[THE OLD WORLD LEFT BEHIND]

As the first stirrings of May 68 begin in Paris, Gil Kemeid arrives from Montreal. A recent scholarship student destined to study architecture, but above all the lover of a young woman whom he unexpectedly leaves, the Egyptian-Quebecer is driven by his dream of travelling through Europe on a symbolic odyssey that would allow him to reconnect with his Levantine origins.

Delayed by the whirlwind of demonstrations that shake the city, he finally arrives in Marseille, where he purchases a used Vespa on which he sets on travelling the roads of France, then Spain, Italy, Yugoslavia, Kosovo, Turkey, Bulgaria, Hungary, Austria, Czechoslovakia, and Bavaria. Along the many punctures and encounters, under good skies and bad rain, he pushes his Rosinante to the limit, while living his dream, without quite realizing it, because the return to Montreal looms ahead, though he promises himself to come back.

Throughout his journey, he writes postcards to his distant lover and confidante, who keeps them all. And it's those cards that decades later allow their son Olivier Kemeid, to re-embark unwillingly on the same crazy journey, riding the 1965 green scooter, stuck to the back of his yet-to-be father. This ride, initially so personal, takes the author's pen to new heights and takes him behind the scenes of History, which his father only glimpsed during his unbridled ride.

A reading delight, this books combines two aspects of a same story: the original initiatory journey, and the filial journey, where the family mythologies - from grandfather to father to son - merge, and transcend.



Marie-Hélène Larochelle has published several scholarly works on monstrosity, violence and invective in contemporary literature. A former top-level swimmer herself, in this first novel she weaves the sensations and feelings brought on by any sporting feat. Je suis le courant la vase was shortlisted for the Trillium Literary Award. Her second novel, Toronto jamais bleue (2024), is also published by Leméac.

ANIMA

Anima opens with a sordid murder: Wahhch Debch returns home and discovers his murdered wife, a knife stuck in the sex and the child she was carrying. A real manhunt begins, a furious inner odyssey that will take him from Montreal across North America to the south, leading him into a real hell: how far can a man go down the well of his pain, and what encounters can he face on his own without losing his mind?

The murderer's name is Nelson Wolf Rooney. He is an American Mohawk hiding in the Kanawake reserve, a dangerous criminal involved in all kinds of schemes. As the Sûreté du Québec's investigation progresses, the fragments of a memory long buried in the depths of his childhood are awakened in Wahhch, as far as the Sabra and Chatila camps, places of darkness and atrocities, even underground, at the heart of human curses.


Wajdi Mouawad has the sure instinct of the writer who dives into his own abysses. Through its sheer literary scope, Anima pushes the boundaries of literature, because this Minotaur of a novel is a beast, both real and fabulous, that wants to devour the Unforgettable.

Born in Lebanon in 1968, Wajdi Mouawad has first lived in Paris, then Montreal, and is now back in Paris where since 2016 he manages the Théâtre national de la Colline. He is notably the author of Le Sang des promesses, an epic theatre quartet whose second part, Incendies, has been brought to the screen by Denis Villeneuve. His second novel after Visage retrouvé (Leméac / Actes Sud, 2002), Anima, has won the prix Phénix de littérature, the Grand Prix Thyde-Monnier of the Société des gens de lettres, the prix de la Méditerranée, the Prize for the second novel of Lecture en tête, the Jury Prize of the Algue d'or and the Catalan Llibreter Prize for foreign novels.

CHRONIQUES DU PLATEAU-MONT-ROYAL

Following the adjustments made by the author to *La diaspora des Desrosiers* cycle when its nine volumes were collected in a single tome, a thorough review of the *Chroniques du Plateau-Mont-Royal* cycle was necessary. Published between 1978 and 1997, the six volumes of the *Chroniques* tell the stories of a family between 1942 and 1963.

Going back in time, *La diaspora*, written between 2007 and 2015, tells the story of a family in the making, between 1913 and 1941.

With the childhood, the past, the adventures and secrets revealed, the attributes of some characters had to be rectified, the chronology of some events needed to be adjusted, lifelines to be straightened. Thanks to these changes, the author now offers a completely new and coherent edition of his seminal work, bridging fiction and reality.



In a convent built by women's hands on the edge of the boreal forest, twenty-four sisters give birth to a little girl who will grow up learning the language and laws of Ina Maka, Mother Earth. A little further away, a worker at the Kohle Co. mine dies in childbirth, leaving an albino baby to her father, who'll work himself to death so the young one can one day become a doctor.


The novel recounts the encounter, mating and destiny of these two dissimilar beings, Daã and Laure, and that of their offspring. It carries the smells of the taiga and the sounds of the city; stories of women fleeing, debacle and children left behind. It goes back to the origins of a lineage from which Noé of Oss and The Body of the Beasts will come out.



Féléor Barthélémy Rü hasn't only inherited a large fortune from his Master Huntsman uncle; he was also bequeathed with the urge to kill and a taste for raw flesh, indulging in those pleasures with women he encounters, some of whom become his wives and his victims.

Mercredi, Constance, Abigaëlle, Frida, Phélie, Lottä, and Marie: seven women, seven experiences in desire, violence, and death; seven voices that reveal unspeakable fantasies and tell of femininity, self-hatred, narcissism, and submission. 



When he wakes up on the morning of his eighteenth birthday, Chris is alone in the modest apartment where he lives with his mother. When night falls and she doesn't come home, the young man realizes that she has simply abandoned him. Thus begins Le boulevard, introducing Chris, an individual with intellectual disability. Overnight, he has to learn to live independently in a difficult environment where, thanks to his endearing candor, he manages to find solidarity and support that help him face the challenges of everyday life, as well as the more extraordinary tribulations.

Gathering in a single volume *Le boulevard*, *Au carrefour*, and *Les avenues*, Sénéchal's three books about what it is to be different and yet living a full life, *Chris* offers readers a philosophical look on life, on the strength and fragility of feelings, on love and parental responsibilities, and on loyalty, friendship, freedom and courage. Rarely has such a perspective been approached so subtly and convincingly in Quebec literature, far removed from caricature and cliché.

Trained in anthropology, Jean-François Sénéchal now dedicates his time to writing. In 2018, his YA novel Le boulevard appeared on the List of Honour of the International Board on Books for Young People (IBBY). His next book, Au carrefour, won the 2019 Prix jeunesse des libraires du Québec in the 12 to 17 year-old category. In 2017, he received the Joseph S. Stauffer Award from the Canada Council for the Arts, a prize aimed at encouraging outstanding promising young Canadians.


[DEBT IS WHERE THE HEART IS]

Mercadet, ruined, has invented a wealthy partner to placate his creditors, and plans to marry off his daughter to a young man he believes to be wealthy, but who is even deeper in debt than he is. Such is the starting point of Balzac's comedy of manners that unfolds a series of misunderstandings and comical situations, ridiculing usurers and other debtors.

This fast-paced adaptation transports the plot to present-day Quebec, to a world of investors who create needs people never knew they had. Here, Balzac's neglected characters (wives, servants) stand out, and the interweaving of their pushy motivations constitutes a dazzling ballet of fabulations. In the eye of the storm, of course, is capitalism, the kind that makes us speculate on appearances. A precise portrait of a genius crook, a social study in which the dominant and the less fortunate stake their lives, the play is a hilarious and speedy settling of the very bedrock of our civilization.

Balzac's play *Mercadet ou Le faiseur* was written in 1840. Gabrielle Chapdelaine's renewed version premiered at Théâtre Denise-Pelletier in January 2023, directed by Alice Ronfard.

Playwright, screenwriter, translator, a 2017 graduate of the Playwriting program at the National Theatre School of Canada, Gabrielle Chapdelaine has participated in several theatrical projects in Quebec, Martinique, France and Germany. Her play Une journée, published by Leméac, won the Prix Gratien-Gélinas in 2018, and is now being translated into English and German; it premiered in the U.S. in 2020, then in Carleton-sur-Mer and at Théâtre de Quat'Sous in 2022.


This play is based on a true story: in Los Angeles, in 2015, the dead body of an individual who claimed to be half-human, half-extraterrestrial was found in his car. His garage was packed with weapons, ammunition, futuristic vehicles and cash. Guillaume Corbeil, author and narrator, decided to go there, pretending to be a reporter. He met with people who knew the man in question – who also claimed to work for the secret service – and collected divergent accounts. It didn't take long before he was drawn into a crazy spiral of tall tales and make-believe.

Yet, the real adventures of his muse are slow to arrive, so he quickly starts to invent them for her.






«Why is living not sufficient for us to attain happiness?»

From that starting point, Wajdi Mouawad's sumptuous, tragic, geopoetic and hard-hitting theatrical mathematics takes us on a whirling ride of possible lives for Talyani Waqar Malik: an Italian neurosurgeon, a Parisian cab driver, a Quebec painter, a Texan death row inmate, a Lebanese shopkeeper. Five destinies in as many different places, all closely interwoven in a single hallucinatory space-time. Each of these incarnations sees their fate disrupted and accelerated in the week following the explosion in the port of Beirut on August 4, 2020, forty-two years after four of them fled the civil war in 1978.

This uchronia brings to the stage the now unforgettable characters of the Domestic Cycle - father, mother, brother, sister, and the imagined descendants of Talyani, Wajdi Mouawad's alter ego - as well as the major themes of the playwright's literary universe, namely war and exile, rape and incest, filiation and unexpected identities, crime and the right to forgiveness. Current issues are also tackled here, such as ecology, cancel culture, physician-assisted dying, and the inexhaustible question of love.

Between point A and point B, youth and old age, science and conscience, between those we love and those we might have loved, the revelations of quantum mechanics shatter the causal link: If I'm here, it's because I'm there... What nearly happened influences what happens, the uncertain influences the certain...
