






Since 2010, the Leméac Jeunesse Series publishes novels and stories first aimed at young people aged twelve and up, but also highly readable by adult readers.

Le jardin d'Amsterdam deftly follows two parallel stories: that of an old woman, Adèle, who would have liked so much to live out her passion with the young soldier she fell in love with during the Second World War, and that of Élaine, who, like all teenagers of her time, complicates her own love affairs. Poignantly written, this novel is also the story of an improbable and saving complicity, of a bridge stretched between generations...

<u>LE VOYAGE</u> À L'ENVERS

[A JOURNEY IN REVERSE]

Sixteen-year-old Laura divides her time between school, her boyfriend Adrien and her part-time job. Underneath this quiet day to day life, stiffled anger is brewing: after five years, the teenager is still angry at her father who could have easily avoided an accident, had he not been so careless to play tennis on a suffocatingly hot day and dying of a heart attack on the court.

When her mother suggests that they should go together on the trip her husband and her were about to make, Laura is reluctant. Yet, in order not to disappoint her mother, she agrees to accompany her. While her mother revisits places full of memories, the young woman struggles to overcome the culture shock, and is torn by conflicting emotions. After a visit to the orphanage where she was sent as a baby, the tensions within her rise, and the barrier she had built for herself finally breaks down.

In this touching and very personal novel, Linda Amyot tackles the difficult question of origins. What determines where one comes from? How and why can we build a link with the country we were born in, without ever having lived there, and where everything is foreign to us?



So the young man makes the drive to his hometown, where the daunting task awaits of choosing what, among the items accumulated in the boxes is worth saving. As he retrieves time-worn familiar objects, vivid memories of moments shared with a first love – the boy across the street -, long since lost, resurface.

Composed like an evocative long poem, this short book sensibly explores the feelings that remain attached to childhood, and the inner light they can still hold, despite the passage of time.



Maman veut partir is a very delicate text, written as poems, that tells of the joyful carefree nature of childhood, the love of parents, and of the slow estrangement from a mother. A distance that is at first desired, chosen, but that soon proves to be absolute.

Readers will put down this book fascinated by the candor and the acuity of the young narrator's gaze, which allows the lightness of quiet happiness, the crumbling of feelings and the abysmal sorrow to shine through.

Jonathan Bécotte is an elementary school teacher. His unmistakable poetic writing style is ever present in his stories and the childlike voices that look for beauty in the ordinary.



SOUFFLER DANS LA CASSETTE

Souffler dans la cassette is a poetic novel about the friendship between two elementary school boys. From their games and adventures will grow the roots of the men they will become.

This book will make readers smile, sometimes tenderly, sometimes nostalgically, and trigger in them the desire to go back to their childhood. The story moves swiftly and prompts the narrator to pass from his candid early school days to the tremors of his first real heartbreak.

[SKIMMING STONES]


Fifteen-year-old Jacob's world shatters when he has to follow his mother who is moving to the country with her new partner. Rebellious, he refuses to settle down for good and spends his time ranting and brooding in the den he's set up near a creek in the village, all the more distraught as, surprisingly, his friends and his girlfriend Tamara answer his messages only occasionally... He devises a plan: to sneak back to Montreal before the two-week deadline imposed by his mother. But his enthusiasm is quickly dampened when, once back in town, he learns why Tamara and her friends have become so distant.

The bitter betrayal felt by Jacob is however progressively soothed by the presence of Henri, a mountain-bike enthusiast, by the high spirits of Emma, an ace at skimming stones, by the generosity of Florette, Emma's grandmother, and by the kindness of amateur mechanics Fred, Étienne and Émile. New bonds are formed, prejudices fall, and Jacob eventually discovers that what seemed like hell to him may not be so bad after all.

Christine Bertrand's Les ricochets is a feelgood novel that eschews all the clichés about country life. The author of La balade de Jo et Alicia (Leméac, 2020) focuses instead on the disarray felt by teenagers uprooted from their world following a move, and she portrays young people living in the country in a rarely seen way in YA fiction.



In this novel in the form of an illustrated exercise program dotted with nutritional advice, Simon Boulerice brings to life again Léon, the endearing protagonist of one of his earlier novels *Jeanne Moreau a le sourire à l'envers*. Right there, in the gym – a fascinating neon landscape – the teenager reads poetry on a stationary bike and copies verses on the training sheets, Marky Mark compulsively sculpts his muscles while his younger brother loses the use of his, and Félindra, an Adidas fairy with extra pounds, drinks Diet Coke while observing her beloved from a distance.


Paysages aux néons is a serious, funny, tender and caustic story, that tackles issues familiar to the author, namely the body and desire, while offering a colourful satire of our obsessions and a benevolent portrait of our vulnerabilities.

Actor, writer, dancer, and stage director, Simon Boulerice is also among the most prolific authors of his generation. His book Jeanne Moreau a le sourire à l'envers was awarded a White Ravens label by the International Youth Library in Munich, Germany, and was also short-listed for the 2014 Quebec Booksellers Association prize for

OLAS

After years of preparation, the day has come when Talía can lavishly celebrates her fifteenth birthday in the *quinceañera* Latin American tradition. But as she dances with her lover, the young Cuban can't help wondering about her future. What life awaits her once the party is over? Her career path seems already set for her: like her parents, she'll become a doctor, get married, raise children, and take care of her grandparents...

Talía gradually becomes aware of the limits imposed by the precarious living conditions in her country. While on vacation with her family, the young woman reunites with her childhood friend, Ulises, who informs her of his plan to move to Florida to become a marine contractor. She then decides to leave with him. Three years will be necessary for them to prepare their flight, with Ulises building their boat, and Talía saving every penny from the sale of her paintings to tourists. Will they make it across the Florida Straits? Will the waves – olas, in Spanish – carry them to the place of their dreams?

María Carla was born in Cuba, and has been living in Quebec since 2013. In Olas, she takes a completely different look at the paradise island so beloved by tourists. In this debut novel written directly in French, the twenty-year-old Montreal student depicts Cuba from the inside, in a strong and lyrical voice reminiscent of her original culture. Yet, it is above a look at the hopes that thousands of young people, in Cuba or elsewhere, dare not entertain, and for which some will go to great lengths to achieve.


under normal circumstances the last one out turns off the light he was out first removed the breaker and suddenly it was dark all around

A few weeks before Christmas, the narrator's world implodes. Coming home from school, in the glare of revolving lights, she learns that her father has taken his own life. At the young age of nine, she is brutally faced with the haunting emptiness left by the desertion of a parent, but also with the incomprehension of her mother, who promptly remaries, eliminating all memory of the departed.

As the years pass, she becomes a tormented teenager barricaded behind a wall of indifference, trying to exorcise through writing the impact that December evening had on her.


Blending narrative and poetic prose, Véronique D'Anjou recounts the blast and the shockwave, the awe and the sadness, the anger and the revolt, the waiting and the fragile beginnings of reconstruction.

Véronique D'Anjou was born in Val-d'Or in 1983. After a few meanderings, she finally settled in Montreal, where she's an elementary school teacher. Blast is her first book.

I'm sick and tired of all those grunge love songs, I really am. They all end up with the singer wailing about how impossible his love is. That's all right, I guess that's the ethos. At a pinch, to be successful at anything in 1998 was seen as dubious. But we're twenty years into the 21st century now, and everything's possible.

Carreauté Kid, a.k.a. Caro, doesn't fit in with his fellow students at his high school: raised by a single-parent father with a mild drinking problem, he's a fan of grunge music, whose spirit he embodies even in his clothing style. A loner and introvert, he's secretly in love with Adele, a beautiful, radiant and levelheaded redhead - except that Adele, despite the obvious chemistry between them, is in a relationship with Aymeric, the popular captain of the school hockey team. Caro shyly opens through the song covers he dedicates to her on his YouTube channel, until the day he decides to confess his feelings in a letter. The situation becomes more complicated when Aymeric gets hold of the letter and makes fun of it on TikTok with his teammates...

In a novel that plays with both nostalgia and issues of our time, Marc-André Dufour-Labbé portrays a young man caught up in the turmoil of a seemingly impossible love. through which he learns about the complexity of feelings and discovers that the solution may lie outside monogamy...

Marc-André Dufour-Labbé was born in Drummondville in 1983. He works for the Centre de ressources pour hommes Drummond. Carreauté Kid is his first YA novel.




[HENRY AND ME]

During the Second World War, a young man from Lac-Saint-Jean joins the troops. But when his best friend dies in combat, his moral convictions are shaken and he decides to flee.

With the army on his tail, he hides in a cave called Le Trou de la Fée – The Fairy Hollow –, where he spends many months with only the animals of the forest for companions and, above all, a book, *Walden or Life in the Woods*. Reading this story by Henry David Thoreau allows him to slowly grasp the surrounding nature, until a profound upheaval occurs in him. "I am no longer who I was", he notices. How far can the deserter take his desertion?


HARE KRISHNA


Soon to be seventeen, Mikael Dionne has left the Beauce region of Quebec for a Montreal drift that led him, after a shoplifting incident, to become a Krishna devotee. When he comes back to his native village dressed as a monk, his head shaved, he may as well come from a distant planet. The occasion is set for him, in spite of himself, to reconnect with his old identity, his brother, his relatives, his friends, and the parish priest; all of them questioning his choice and trying to bring him back on the "right path." But can this life paved in advance still suit him?

François Gilbert published two acclaimed first novels, Coma and La maison d'une autre, before embarking on a praised trilogy for young readers. He was the winner of the Governor General's Award in 2016 for Hare Krishna, which title was on the list of the White Ravens.



Eux is the story of a bullied teenager. A young boy beaten, robbed, and ridiculed beyond reason by his classmates. A young person whose distress is ignored by those who turn a blind eye: the other students, the school staff, the parents, the few friends. His pain is so strong, his agony so long, that he's driven to exact take revenge on his torturers, to become the source of an inconceivable violence. In short chapters, Patrick Isabelle recounts how this tragedy came to be, this account being in itself another tragedy, just as terrible but more insidious. In doing so, he blurs the line separating the victims from the perpetrators, and invites us to reflect on the potential for cruelty, but also for empathy, that lies dormant in everyone. Them: what if they were us? A shocking novel as disturbing as it is essential.

Patrick Isabelle writes for both teenager and adult readers. He has received several awards, including the Prix jeunesse des libraires du Québec for his novels



CAMILLE


In Camille, Patrick Isabelle explores the issue of violence further. The story is set within a broken family where abuse and love form an explosive combination that is difficult to understand from an outside point of view. Young Camille grows up amidst tension, fears and desires. She is the witness of her parents' arguments and reconciliations, but she is also the target of her father's fits of anger. At school, she has to cover her legs and arms, hide the bruises on her body. Often, she just would like to disappear, as attested by the entries in her diary, whose heartbreaking passages are part of the novel.

One night, her panicked mother wakes her up and they both flee. Thus begins a desperate flight that will lead them to Acadia, a return to their roots. With a cousin she had never met before, Camille abandons herself to the beauty of the landscape, the sea and a complicity that slowly leads her to discover herself. She also meets a boy with whom she falls in love.

Then Camille disappears. Everyone starts looking for her, and so many questions arise: Was she kidnapped? Did she take her own life? Did she run away? Not far from the restaurant where mother and daughter had found a job, the police discover the father's pick-up truck. Such a man could be your uncle, your neighbour, the father of your best friend...

Struggling with an unlimited quota of fear, the novel's main character is constantly bombarded by her thoughts.

Her mother travels to Italy with her new flame. Her father cries in the shower. The planet's carbon footprint is at an all-time high. Her friends have told her off. She must deal with eco-anxiety, eviction, influencers, social media, the moral contradictions of our time.

Fortunately, she can rely on Régis, her homeless friend, and the single-parent waitress at the local snack bar, on Orion. But most of all, she can count on life-saving writing and acts of rebellion; on the happiness spreading all around, and on the future that's just around the corner.

Fluctuating between bitterness and tenderness, harshness and sensitivity, demands and indulgence, mixing caustic dialogues, sitcom scripts and poetry in a fragmented narrative, Sarah Lalonde's voice both hurts and consoles.

Driven by two straightforward, singular narrative voices, Stéfani Meunier's first YA novel is a clear and uncompromising text that gives substance to the elusive malaise that sometimes besets people who are different.




