But we have disrupted their flow and jeopardised the very basis of life all over the planet. What influence do these drugs, about which we know very little, have? In her search for answers, biologist Kerstin Hoppenhaus follows these elements around the world and through time, from individual cells to ecosystems, from over-fertilised fields to politics. RÜDIGER GÖRNER

Anton Bruckner (1824 – 1896) was a highly acclaimed organist. Originally from the Upper Austrian province, he celebrated success in Paris and London. However, his compositions garnered little attention during his lifetime; his detractors and opponents, most notably Johannes Brahms, disregarded and vilified them. Richard Wagner was the only composer with whom Bruckner, who suffered from self-doubt, was able to establish a relationship, albeit one that was contradictory and confusing. Wagner saw something in Bruckner's compositions that other contemporaries could not see. Ultimately, the heyday of Bruckner's music only came after his death.

Rüdiger Görner skilfully interweaves the life and work of the soloist Bruckner in a narrative style that offers a glimpse into the works and the soul of the person behind them.

He powerfully illustrates how the simple life of this provincial, strait-laced anarchist culminated in an impressive musical worldliness that led directly into the modern age.



As populists all over the world undermine liberal legal systems, we still regard our democracy as invincible. The enemies of pluralist democracies abuse rights under the pretext that they represent the true interests of the people. What is currently threatening German democracy? Maximilian Steinbeis, a lawyer and polemical expert on diverse aspects of the German constitution, uses Thuringia as an example of how populists could destroy the free state by abusing its laws and institutions. 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

NATAN SZNAIDER

The Germans love Nathan the Wise. Nevertheless, Lessing's character's hope that one day it won't matter if someone is a Jew - hasn't come to pass. Hannah Arendt made a clear statement opposing Jewish assimilation in her 1959 Lessing Prize acceptance address, arguing that it would eventually result in the eradication of Jewish identity. Since the Enlightenment, the Jewish conundrum of conformity versus autonomy has remained unresolved. The conflict between religious and secular identities is present even in Israel. This conflict, in Natan Sznaider's opinion, will never go away. He makes the case that, despite our differences, we should all accept it and recognise that we are all equal among unequals.



Herbert Kickl operated in the shadows for almost three decades. He was the man who wrote Jörg Haider's speeches, and the fiercely disputed slogans that helped Heinz-Christian Strache into office as the Vice Chancellor of Austria. He has also been the only minister since 1945 to be dismissed from office. In the past, Kickl's radical rhetoric, acerbic argumentation and agitation stood in the way of his career. However, these characteristics now correspond to a zeitgeist that aspires to dismantle liberal democracy not only in Austria, but across Europe, with Alice Weidel, Viktor Orbán, Marine Le Pen, and other right-wing populists. Gernot Bauer and Robert Treichler have traced back this problem to its roots and provide a new perspective on an ascetic ideologue, a volatile platform for the people and an incendiary politician.


Karl-Markus Gauß





Russia's war, migration, climate change, inflation and a second term of Trump? An apocalyptic mood is in the air again.
