

For centuries, space has been the domain of the divine and the unknown, unapproachable and sacred place, then instrument of competition between world powers, today the objective behind the activity of public and private companies that, in this dimension, glimpse economic value, material resources and global benefits for our future. Nations and commercial enterprises who until a few years ago were detached from any extraatmospheric perspective, now look out the window to the cosmos ready to invest so that they might extract prestige and earnings.

Emilio Cozzi, among the most notable disseminators of space content and technological innovation in Italy, guides us on the discovery of the extraterrestrial economy and geopolitics, retracing the fundamental milestones that in the course of history have made space reachable, with costly and not-without-risk space missions that have, however, brought humanity closer to infinity and beyond. How have we come from the Soyuz, the first attempted Russian space missions, to SpaceX, Elon Musk's space company, which, in 2023, carried out no less than 100 launches of its Falcon 9 rockets? How have we passed from the technical difficulties of Apollo 13 to the space tourism promoted by Jeff Bezos and Blu Origin, his company that aims for the advancement of missile technology and access to space for "all"? What is the impact of a potential industry of extra-terrestrial voyages, and what role does the conquest of space have in the geopolitical balance of the world? Are we talking about space colonialism? And lastly, what role does Europe play in respect to other countries when, with even Operation Cargo-2028 alone, it will once again be equipped with a suitable space structure?

Thanks to the detailed and fascinating journey of Cozzi, we can understand the present dynamics that are advancing the new space economy and preparing us to live in a new era - in reality already begun - that is in continual and swift expansion. The new space economy doesn't concern only the space sector in a strict sense, as it extends to the ever more pervasive and mutable impacts of products, services and knowledge that derive from space.

Humanity is enjoying the effects of a new collective race beyond the sky: activity in sectors seemingly distant from the space industry, like precision agriculture, insurance planning, realtime surveillance, and economic calculations, derive from and increasingly depend on satellite signals and data. New economic activity, often far from investment in orbital infrastructures, is born and proliferates in this direction. And if today, the only space stations able to host crews for multiple months at a time are the Chinese Tiangong and the International Space Station, very soon there will be more: to continue doing technological and scientific research, to study the human body and its matter, to create new materials and new pharmaceuticals, to record films with realistic effects in environments void of gravity, and to open new paths to entertainment and art.

Space is the new centre of Earth; after all, Tziolkovskij, the theoretical father of astronautics, who did all of the calculations to carry out the first ever space flights, asserted with conviction, that "Earth is the cradle of humanity, but one cannot live in the cradle forever."

Sara is a woman, a mother. She is unemployed, single, and an immigrant. Her identity is a layered one, singular and unrepeatable. These social characteristics will render her suspicious for the rest of her life. Because, to a mathematical model – and to her country's government – Sara is only a set of markers that, added together, generate a high-risk score, a statistical prediction that transforms her into a potential criminal. But her only fault is that of being herself, and of sharing a similar profile to other people who existed and were accused before her.

This and many other stories show us that a single number calculated by an algorithm can change the fate of entire social groups, risking a return to ancient injustices, amplified by the way in which we use these tools today. By retracing the history of technology, we can also pass through the history of social exclusion: every invention, from the bicycle to the microwave, right up to artificial intelligence, is the result of precise choices, values and human compromises that cause strong impacts on society. Thanks to the rediscovery of many feminist contributions proposed during the seventies and noughties, *Technology of Revolutions* pushes us to reflect on how to intervene to ensure that technological revolutions don't lead to social regressions.



Franco Basaglia is the man behind the law that revolutionised psychiatric institutions in Italy: law 180 of 1978, which decreed the closure of the insane asylums, and regulated obligatory sanitary treatment. That moment of rousing social emancipation was the result of a turning point brought about by a military doctor who was, at the same time, one of the major intellectuals of his time. From the conferences that he led in Brazil in 1979, his thinking emerges clear and defined, just like his mission to transform the public institution in which he was working to generate a real social impact. The transcriptions of the conferences are an important tool for moving closer to and understanding the thinking and activism of Basaglia; who in open dialogue with doctors, nurses, students, psychotherapists, and unionists, presents his reflections on the proposed themes, allowing for his incredible communicative capacity to emerge, as well as his way of working, and at the same time, his way of playing politics.

In 1969, Franco Basaglia and his wife and colleague Franca Ongaro asked the celebrated Italian photographers Gianni Berengo Gardin and Carla Cerati to photograph mentally ill people institutionalized in Italian psychiatric asylums. They agreed to the request, but things were not always easy. At one point, nurses in Parma sought to confiscate their negatives, but Berengo Gardin handed over blank film instead: the book includes some of those photos. In 1978, almost a decade after Einaudi published the book, "Law 180" came into effect, dismantling all such institutions.

What are the ancient fables if not a lens through which to observe ourselves? Interrogating the feminine figures of myth that often compete against each other or against an invisible enemy that tragically steers their destiny, and observing them from the point of view of the contemporary, Bianca Sorrentino restores the immortal heroines to their role as symbols in which to see our reflections or from which to distance ourselves. The roles that our "mythological ancestors" performed are still valid in the present, and they help us to interrogate ourselves on that subtle boundary between the legitimate claim of recognition and the risk that any clear-cut definition becomes limiting. Every woman of myth - Hecuba, Antigone, Dido, Medea, Electra and all the others ideally dialogues with her counterparts about current events, literature, cinema, and science, raising themes that, though deriving from the feminine experience, transversally concern every individual and the living collective: civil engagement, concealment of pain, the search for one's own voice, the search for love. Victims and warriors, mothers, daughters and sisters, lovers, sovereigns and citizens, the women of the ancient world, show us how the feminine perspective, traditionally considered as lesser, manages, however, in some ways to broaden horizons of universality, inviting us to reach an interpermeation between masculine and feminine principles.







It has changed structure, materials, environments: its "fluidity" - which adapts to the sensitivity of the interpreter and who listens to it - transforms it from mechanical object to biological organism capable of transformation and adaptation. While we meet piano makers, authors, and interpreters, we realise that most likely the piano is immortal.

Piero De Martini The (Almost) Happy **Summers of Gustav Mahler** Between Attersee and Wörthersee, 1893-1907

Mahler used to compose in the summer. In the other seasons, as well as reviewing and orchestrating his compositions, he was the director of an orchestra. It was his sister Justine who oversaw the search for a summer place that facilitated her brother's concentration and resulting work. In particular, there were two places that for different summers were the ideal setting for the creation of Mahlerian music. The little village of Steinbach with the mountains and a beautiful lake nearby, and Maiernigg, where he stayed from 1900 to 1907, which remained famous for the "Little House of Composing" that had been purposely built. Those places turned out to be happy oases for the extraordinary industriousness of Mahler who completed no less than seven symphonies. Elsewhere, his work struggled: the composer seemed parched. Piero De Martini retraces those fruitful seasons until July 1907, when suddenly, his five-year-old daughter died and less happy summers followed, where the enchantment of the

productive isolation had been broken, and for Mahler, a final glimpse of life opened up in which, though having still many things to say and confront, it was impossible for him to recover his former serenity and lightness, and

to overcome a tragic sentiment of life.

Rediscovered relatively recently in comparison to Bach or Händel, his music has in fact undergone extreme reconstructions and superficial approaches for decades. Even today, people mistakenly believe that he was a simple or lightweight artist, and his scores little more than shorthand to be integrated with ornamentations, improvisations, special effects, and every other kind of interpretative license. Federico Maria Sardelli, one of the most eminent scholars and interpreters of the Venetian maestro, restores with this work the just merit to Vivaldi's intentions. Thanks to a thorough survey of his handwritten musical instructions, Sardelli brings to light how the scores are, in general, already complete with many useful directions for performing.
