

What is an idea? Where does it come from? Is it a sudden apparition or the result of long preparation? Since forever, humankind has wondered about the instant in which intuition takes place, generating research, debate, and new questions. Intertwining philosophy and neuroscience, and psychology and biology, Edoardo Boncinelli retraces the footsteps of those who investigated the enigma of creativity. It was Socrates who first reflected on the content of words, defining the notion of 'concept'; Plato placed ideas at the centre of thought, putting their existence before knowledge; the empiricists, on the other hand, established the primacy of experience. In every age, human beings have sought to fathom the genesis of the products of their brains, from mental images to memory. Even today, when faced with figures such as Leonardo da Vinci, Leopardi, or Einstein, we cannot help but wonder where great ideas come from, how we can distinguish valid ones from useless ones, what link exists between intelligence and creativity, and whether genius really does sometimes border on madness. Through descriptions of how neurons and the nervous system work, analyses of cognitive tests, contributions from genetics, and theories on artificial intelligence, Boncinelli guides us through the many hypotheses that have attempted to solve the "problem of all problems": the inaccessibility of our minds.

It's all very well saying 'cutlet', but what exactly do we mean? Everyone has their own idea of the perfect cutlet, but there are of course many different types. Ancient cuisine is populated by a myriad of proto-cutlets that had some features in common with the modern version, but were far removed from the current model. Ever since the cutlet became more than just a gastronomic product, embodying the role of a regional specialty, everyone has felt compelled to explain the circumstances of its birth. For the Milanese, for example, it was essential to prove that the cutlet was not a modern invention but had already been present in the city since the Middle Ages. Luca Cesari guides us on this journey to discover a seemingly simple and versatile dish that appeared in medieval times and spread not only to Milan but also to other major European cities such as London, Vienna, and Paris, starting with the legends that have been passed down over the centuries, straddling truth and tradition.

What happens when poetry ceases to be words and becomes place, matter, a landscape in continuous transformation? The Beyond is a journey to the margins of language, where writing intertwines with the wild world, and abandonment becomes a space for rebirth. Laura Pugno explores the boundary where words cease describing and begin existing, questioning what it means to inhabit language as one inhabits a territory. Through Gilles Clément's concept of the "Third Landscape," the author traverses uncultivated margins and forgotten interstices, places where biodiversity resists outside the logic of power and production. It is there that poetry also takes refuge and regenerates itself: a liminal territory between the visible and the invisible, between the urban and the wild, between memory and future. Language itself becomes a forest crisscrossed by uncertain paths, a map yet to be deciphered. An invitation to rethink our relationship with words and nature.



From Pier Paolo Pasolini to Mario Mieli

This book tells the story of a missed encounter: Mario Mieli and Pier Paolo Pasolini 'meet' not in person but through their posthumous books, which are read here, the one through the other. Silvia de Laude retraces the figures and last works of the two authors; Mieli, one of the most radical and complex figures of the Italian and European homosexual movement, and Pasolini, one of the greatest Italian intellectuals of the 20th century, highlighting their differences and similarities. Both, in different ways, made their bodies and the staging of their bodies a realisation of their works, and were obsessed with myth and the sacred. Otherwise, one could not imagine two more different writers in terms of social background, education, culture, temperament, political commitment, and the struggle for gay rights. And yet, in addition to the performative use of their own image and their fascination with the sacred, they are linked, as is evident in their two posthumous novels, *Petrolio* and Il risveglio dei faraoni, by an unexpected network of similarities and mirror images, which leads to a terrain of fluctuating identity, androgyny, and initiation.

How Machines Think About and Transform Human Experience

Machines can think? This question doesn't concern only the future of technology but also the profound meaning of what we define as human. Lorenzo Perilli doesn't limit himself to exploring what AI could become but examines how its existence is already redefining our understanding of consciousness and reality itself. Artificial Consciousness examines the origins of the idea of consciousness, from ancient philosophy to modern science. Through the history of thinking machines, Perilli explores the boundaries between simulation and awareness, between learning and comprehension. Key concepts such as "imitation intelligence" and the "Turing test" are analysed, along with the neural networks and algorithms that today learn, predict, and operate. But is a system that responds in a complex way also aware of doing so? Or is consciousness something more, something that science still isn't able to capture? This book is a journey into the uncertain confines between human and artificial, where consciousness may cease to be exclusively human. If memory, intuition, and even emotion can be replicated, the distinction between human and artificial dissolves. Perilli invites us to reflect on our role in a world where technology is no longer an instrument, but a possible new form of existence. The question isn't if machines will become conscious, but how this will change forever our definition of life and thought.

Sara is a woman, a mother. She is unemployed, single, and an immigrant. Her identity is a layered one, singular and unrepeatable. These social characteristics will render her suspicious for the rest of her life. Because, to a mathematical model - and to her country's government - Sara is only a set of markers that, added together, generate a high-risk score, a statistical prediction that transforms her into a potential criminal. But her only fault is that of being herself, and of sharing a similar profile to other people who existed and were accused before her.

This and many other stories show us that a single number calculated by an algorithm can change the fate of entire social groups, risking a return to ancient injustices, amplified by the way in which we use these tools today. By retracing the history of technology, we can also pass through the history of social exclusion: every invention, from the bicycle to the microwave, right up to artificial intelligence, is the result of precise choices, values and human compromises that cause strong impacts on society. Thanks to the rediscovery of many feminist contributions proposed during the seventies and noughties, Technology of Revolutions pushes us to reflect on how to intervene to ensure that technological revolutions don't lead to social regressions.



Every textile tells of a journey, from the coarse fibres to the finished work, and to touch one means to discover traditions and innovations that merge, listening to the murmur of the loom, hearing the breath of those who have weaved threads and dreams. This little manual is a voyage across the poetry of textiles, an invitation to discover worlds that live in every fibre, to let yourself be enchanted by the quiet dialogue between tradition and modernity. Because every fabric, like every story, is a mystery that is waiting to be unveiled.

A few years pass and Evans sits at the piano at the Village Vanguard, alongside Scott LaFaro and Paul Motian. A legendary group that revolutionised the traditional roles of the piano trio. LaFaro's tragic death brought a sudden end to a unique musical experiment. Evans fell silent in grief, and heroin came to soothe his deep depression. Having hit rock bottom, however, the pianist rose like a phoenix. The 1970s arrived, and his music returned to shine, with partners such as Eddie Gomez, Marc Johnson, Marty Morell, and in collaborations with George Russell, Tony Bennett, and Stan Getz. In these pages, Pieranunzi manages to restore Bill Evans and his aura, as if improvising over a well-laid backing track, mixing his impressions as an expert listener with the testimonies of those who knew him and played with him. The result is a passionate and rigorous portrait, a true dialogue between great musicians.



Inside the Manuscripts

Among those of his time, Antonio Vivaldi was the composer perhaps most subjected to misinterpretations and deliberate misunderstandings. Rediscovered relatively recently in comparison to Bach or Händel, his music has in fact undergone extreme reconstructions and superficial approaches for decades. Even today, people mistakenly believe that he was a simple or lightweight artist, and his scores little more than shorthand to be integrated with ornamentations, improvisations, special effects, and every other kind of interpretative license. Federico Maria Sardelli, one of the most eminent scholars and interpreters of the Venetian maestro, restores with this work the just merit to Vivaldi's intentions. Thanks to a thorough survey of his handwritten musical instructions, Sardelli brings to light how the scores are, in general, already complete with many useful directions for performing. Contrary to popular belief – even if Vivaldi didn't leave any writings on his music, poetics, or way of composing or performing - these pages reveal him to be the most generous of Italian baroque composers with technical and musical information. Guided by Sardelli, for the first time we come into close contact with his manuscripts, treasure chests of a tremendous amount of knowledge, crucial to comprehending his way of understanding and to interpreting his creations.

Salvatore La Porta Demichov


On the 3rd December 1967, the first-ever human heart transplant was successfully performed. Among the research that enabled this result, there is that of the Soviet surgeon Vladimir Demichov, who dedicated his entire life to the cause. The road of scientific progress is often a long one, filled with failures that, although necessary to arrive at the final destination, are difficult to accept. Demichov's was exactly that: born in a Russian farming family at the beginning of the 20th century, he used to observe his mother disassemble, repair, and re-assemble watches, and he began to wonder if it would be possible to disassemble and reassemble a living being too. Salvatore La Porta reconstructs the work of Demichov. known for his experiments on dogs, the most famous of all being the one with the dog with two heads, which drew ethical judgement from the government and his colleagues. The life of a misunderstood scientist considered a new Frankenstein by many, who with his work contributed to the birth of modern transplantology.

Filippo Tuena Michelangelo

Michelangelo is a thirty-year literary struggle with the biography, creations, and imagination of Michelangelo Buonarroti. Tuena guides us on a flâneuristic and personal pilgrimage into and around the myth of Michelangelo, which for more than five hundred years has continued to fascinate and intoxicate the world with ecstasy and torment, yearning and genius, dream and sin.


Clelia Marchi **Not a Word of a Lie**

Clelia Marchi was a woman like many others who lived through the 20th Century. Born into a family of very humble origins in 1912, she died in 2006 after losing four of her eight children, living through two world wars, and enduring an entire existence of sacrifices, poverty, and struggle. When, by 1972, Clelia seemed to have earned herself a quiet life, surrounded by the affections of her grandchildren and greatgrandchildren, her husband Anteo, the love of her life, died in an accident. To find a release from the pain and make it bearable, Clelia, almost illiterate, began to write. And she wrote her life, first in notebooks, and then onto a bedsheet. Her embroidered bedsheet, this story "on the thread of sincerity", became the deeply moving and introspective *Not a Word of a Lie*.




