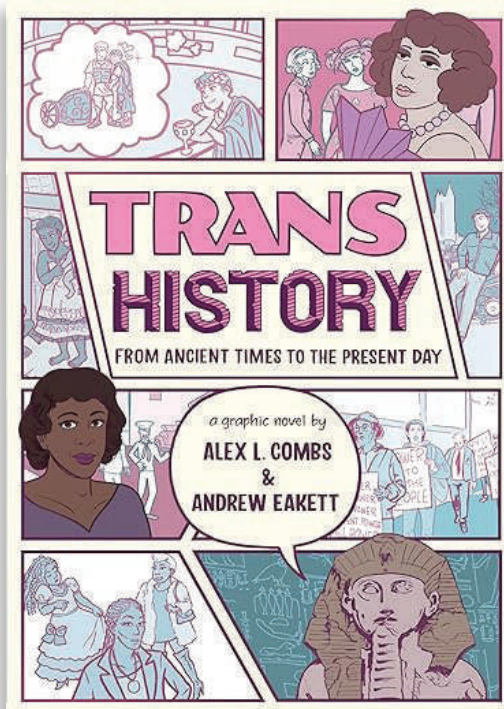

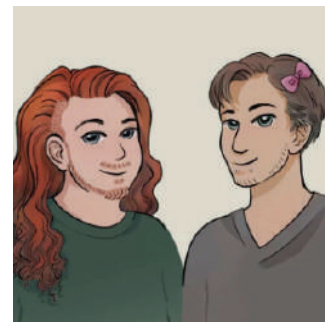

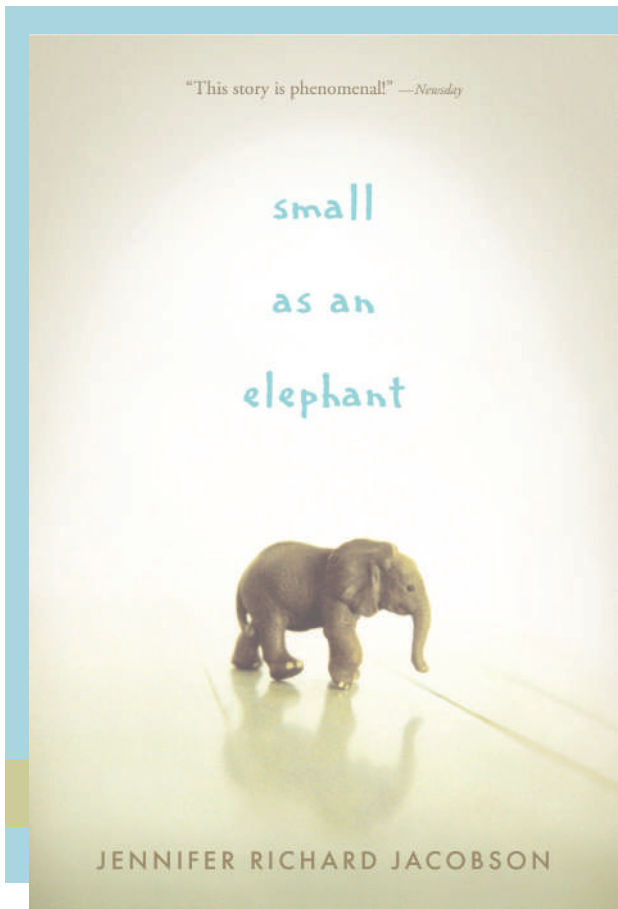

Extensive source notes provide further resources. Moving, funny, heartbreaking, and empowering, this remarkable compendium from trans creators Alex L. Combs and Andrew Eakett is packed with research on every dynamic page.

We'll never know the exact number, but possibly as many as 250,000 children rode orphan trains between 1865 and 1930. This "placing out" program was the forerunner to modern day foster homes. Some say they were a good thing, others are horrified at the thought of lining children up to be looked over by prospective parents. It's estimated that perhaps 50 percent of the children found good homes. The other 50 percent were taken as workers or were shuffled from home to home or abused in various ways. Yet even these orphan train riders frequently express their gratitude to the orphan trains for giving them a chance at life—a chance often denied them in the brutal environs of a vast city that offered no shelter.

The children became homeless for a variety of reasons. Many were the offspring of newly arrived immigrants who fell on hard times and could not support their families. Some were removed from their homes for abuse. Others ran away. Sometimes children were orphaned when their parents died of illness or from accidents.

The Children's Aid Society of New York City started the orphan trains as a means to find families for these destitute youngsters. The notion was that farm families could use the children's help, and in return would feed and clothe them, and in every way treat them as members of their families. When it worked this way, which it often did, it was a satisfactory solution all around.

Most children described the selection process at the end of the train ride as traumatic. They wanted badly to make a good impression and be chosen, yet it was so difficult to be stared at, checked over, and sometimes rejected.

In writing *Orphan Train Rider*, Andrea Warren especially enjoyed meeting and interviewing those who participated in this program. These people had worked to promote the history of the orphan trains, and all had talked to countless schoolchildren about their experiences. She was privileged to have known them.

Andrea Warren is the author of many acclaimed nonfiction books for young readers, including *Orphan Train Rider: One Boy's True Story*, which won the Boston Globe–Horn Book Award. Andrea lives in Kansas.

Friedman takes over Capa's identity, and Gerda takes the last name Taro for herself as she takes on more photography assignments. Her sharp eye serves her well as the unstoppable pair sets off to Spain to cover the growing conflict that becomes the Spanish Civil War. As Gerda pushes closer and closer to the front line, she risks her life to show the hopeful side of the republic torn apart by the deadly fascist insurrection.

Dad busts Fin’s secret mission but agrees to take him out one last time. Fin locates the treasure, but greed stalks at his side after the loot gets lugged aboard. The babysitter threatens them with a speargun, prompting Dad to show uncharacteristic bravery, but his show of strength gets him wounded, leaving Fin to save them.

Once the treasure is secured, they discover it belonged to a man named Pickerberry. Unfortunately, Pickerberry’s ghost wants it back. Rejuvenated with the news of the recovered treasure, Abuelo decides to return the gold to its rightful owners: Pickerberry’s grandchildren, to rescue their ocean studies camp in the Keys that was destroyed by the hurricane. After all, the real treasure was the adventure, the hunt and the discovery of family bonds.

It’s 1941 and ten-year-old Norman Mineta is a carefree fourth grader in San Jose, California, who loves baseball, hot dogs, and Cub Scouts. But when Japanese forces attack Pearl Harbor, Norm’s world is turned upside down.

One by one, things that he and his Japanese American family took for granted are taken away. In a matter of months they, along with everyone else of Japanese ancestry living on the West Coast, are forced by the government to move to internment camps, leaving everything they have known behind.

At the Heart Mountain internment camp in Wyoming, Norm and his family live in one room in a tar paper barracks with no running water. There are lines for the communal bathroom, lines for the mess hall, and they live behind barbed wire and under the scrutiny of armed guards in watchtowers.

Meticulously researched and informed by extensive interviews with Mineta himself, *Enemy Child* sheds light on a little-known subject of American history. Andrea Warren covers the history of early Asian immigration to the United States and provides historical context on the U.S. government’s decision to imprison Japanese Americans alongside a deeply personal account of the sobering effects of that policy.

Warren takes readers from sunny California to an isolated wartime prison camp and finally to the halls of Congress to tell the true story of a boy who rose from “enemy child” to a distinguished American statesman. Mineta was the first Asian mayor of a major city (San Jose) and was elected ten times to serve in the U.S. House of Representatives, where he worked tirelessly to pass legislation, including the Civil Liberties Act of 1988. He also served as Secretary of Commerce and Secretary of Transportation. He has had requests by other authors to write his biography, but this is the first time he has said yes because he wanted young readers to know the story of America’s internment camps.

Norman Mineta was a ten-time Congressional representative, who served as Secretary of Commerce and Secretary of Transportation.

A product of meticulous research and extensive interviews with Norman himself, *Enemy Child* is the first biography written with Mineta’s cooperation, and a timely introduction to a lesser-known, troubling moment of American history.

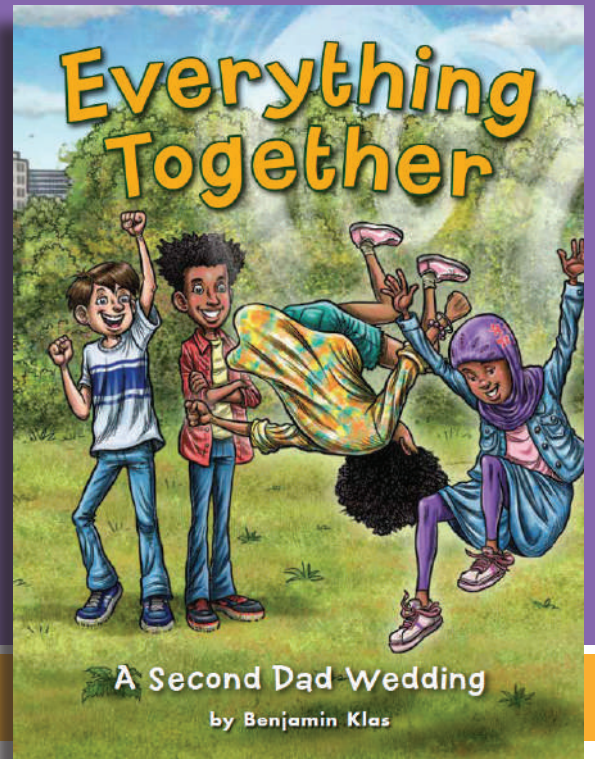

As the violence in Bleeding Kansas escalated, he joined the infamous Jayhawkers, seeking revenge on Missourians, and then became a soldier, scout, and spy in the Civil War—all by age seventeen.

This how-to guide provides projects for children and teens interested in awakening their creativity and learning carving and woodworking skills. The handbook's 35 carving projects are organized by increasing complexity and are divided into three age ranges. From a simple xylophone and a baseball award to a double whistle and a woodcut scene, there's a skill-level-appropriate project to suit a wide range of ages. Group one, for children ages four to eight, features supervised projects using sanding and stamping tools. Projects in group two, designed for children ages nine to 12, make use of sanding tools and, for those who have enough dexterity and strength to use them, a knife or v-tool. Group three presents projects for teens requiring minimal if any supervision and have the dexterity to make basic knife cuts and gouges. All of these projects can be crafted from commonly found pieces of wood.

Robin Edward Trudel is a computer consultant who writes articles for carving magazines and teaches woodcarving as a volunteer. He has been a contributing author to Carving Magazine, the premier magazine for woodcarvers since its inception. Invited to write an article on introducing carving to children, the result caught the eye of Linden publishing who has helped Robin to develop two books on woodcarving specifically for children. He lives in Dracut, Massachusetts.

GRAVE SECRETS

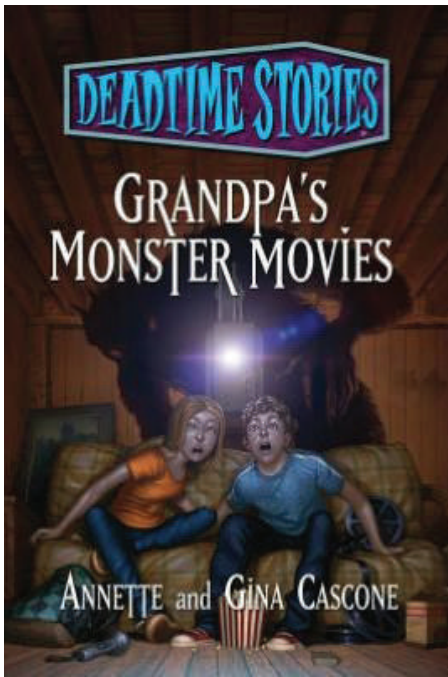

GRANDPA'S MONSTER MOVIES

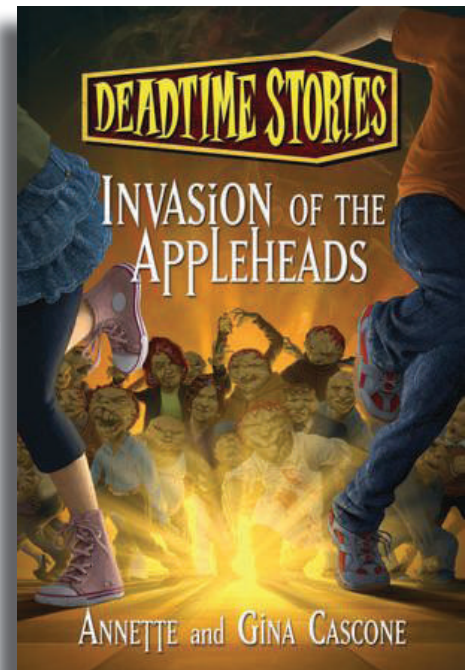

Now Katie and Andy have to find a way to turn their parents back to normal—before it's too late!

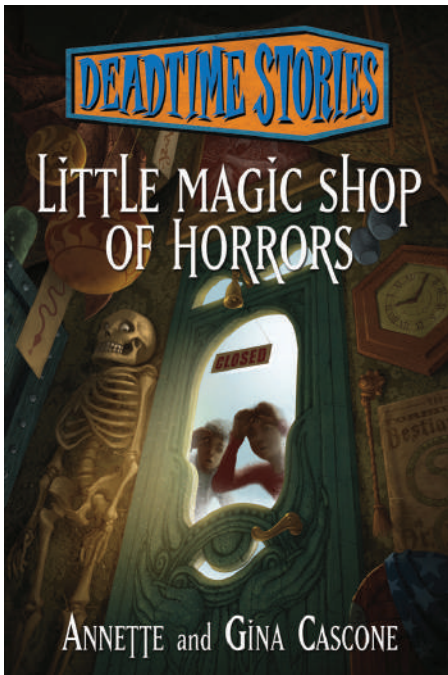

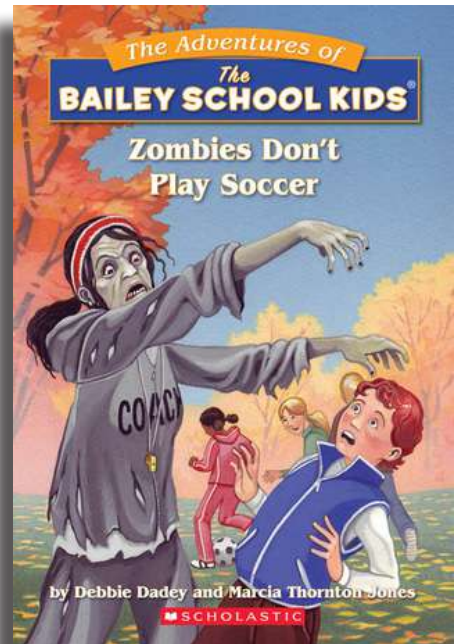
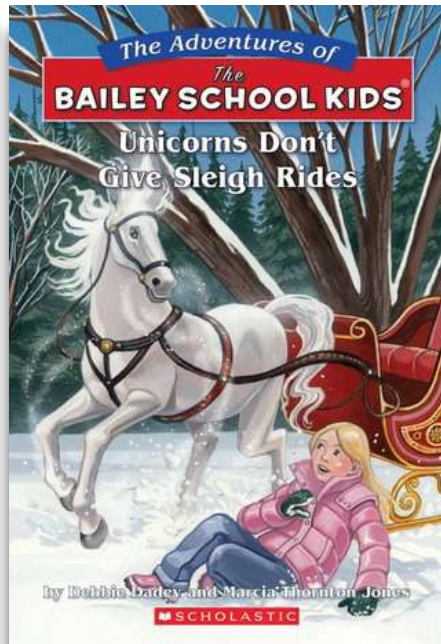
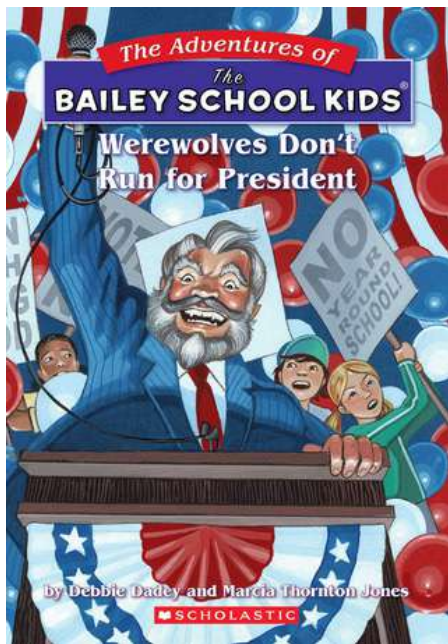
THE BEAST OF BASKERVILLE

The reader is left guessing whether the innocuous character is REALLY a mythical being or not.
